

Fort Hill Members and Friends Share Favorite Bible Verses

A few months ago, Pastor Marc invited members and friends of Fort Hill to let him know what their favorite Bible verses are, and why these verses are meaningful to their faith. This month, our Director of Music & Communications, Jacob Dishman, is sharing his favorite Bible verse.

Revelation 22: 1-2

"Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, as clear as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb down the middle of the great street of the city. On each side of the river stood the tree of life, bearing twelve crops of fruit, yielding its fruit every month. And the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations."

"I love this verse, not least because it is some of the most beautiful and comforting imagery in the entirety of the Bible. I like to imagine a cool, fresh breeze coming off the river, and people enjoying the shade under the trees lining the crystal clear waters. All is set right, and we live abundantly with the literal living presence of Christ beaming with light.

These verses settle my heart. These verses remind me that God has provided for us in so many ways, with blessings flowing from heaven like the water from the center of the Holy City. They remind me of Jesus' words, when he said that anyone who believes in him will have rivers of living water flowing from their heart. (John 7:38) Finally, they remind me to be joyful and at peace, knowing that God has something incomprehensibly wonderful in the works for His creation. It is a beautiful hope."

Rev. Dr. F. Douglas Dillard, Jr. was a mentor and friend who modeled what a pastor should be. I had the privilege of serving for three years as the associate pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church where Doug was serving as senior pastor. In addition to being a gifted pastor, Doug was a gifted preacher. The theological depth and the practical application of his sermons were always a call to faith.

One of Doug's sermons, recorded in the book, Journeying with God, (ACW Press) is entitled "Oh, if I



had Wings." Based on Psalm 55:5: 'Oh, that I had wings like a dove! For then would I fly away, and be at rest.,' Doug proposes "a word in favor of flight. Some change of scenery, some form of alternating activity with leisure, is frequently essential for renewal and revitalization. ... and the wonderful thing is that one can take a dozen or so flights on a given day – each one lasting for just a minute or so. In the middle of some pressure-packed day, between appointments, before the trial begins, or the patient arrives, or a customer is to be seen, or the children come in, or the telephone rings, one can say with the psalmist, 'Wait on the Lord; be of good courage, and the Lord shall strengthen your

heart' (Psalm 27:14). "And that's a four-second flight.

"Or, 'Return unto your rest, O my soul, for the Lord had dealt bountifully with you' (Psalm 13:6). A five-second flight. Alternating activity with leisure, or periodic flight, is essential to balance. The juices of life have a way of souring when they are pressed without letup. But there is another side to it. The flight into tranquility prepares us for the return to activity. ... What are you facing? What problems? What fears? Do you feel like saying, 'Oh, that I had wings like a dove?'"

"The psalmist was wise: Alternate activity with leisure and rest. But we fly back, remembering that God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and love and discipline. And we face and go through whatever life has placed before us."

Observing a National Day of Prayer

The National Day of Prayer is observed annually on the first Thursday in May. This day observance, designated by the United States Congress, asks people "to turn to God in prayer and meditation."

In the early 1950s, an evangelical movement called for Congress and the President to proclaim a National Day of Prayer. The movement grew and a young leader, Evangelist Billy Graham, led services for approximate-

ly 20,000 on the steps of the Capitol on February 3, 1952. Later that year, Congress proclaimed a joint resolution for a National Day of Prayer. President Harry S. Truman proclaimed a National Day of Prayer to be observed on July 4, 1952. Each year since that date, Americans have observed the day in their own way. The observance was moved to the first Thursday in May by President Ronald Reagan and has been proclaimed each year since.

Honor Your Mother

Anna Jarvis, the woman who first suggested a national day to honor mothers, had an incredible mother to honor. Her mom, Ann Reeves Jarvis (1832 -1905), was a Sunday school teacher and activist who helped lower infant-mortality rates in Appalachia and promoted friendship among families of Civil War soldiers.

At a memorial service for her mother, Anna Jarvis distributed carnations — her mom's favorite flower — to attendees. Her idea to set apart one day each year for moms gained traction, and in 1914, President Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday of May Mother's Day. It was customary by then to wear white carnations in honor of departed mothers and red carnations to honor the living.

Of the white flowers, Jarvis said they "symbolize the truth, purity and broad-charity of mother love; its fragrance, her memory, and her prayers. The carnation does not drop its petals, but hugs them to its heart as it dies, and so, too, mothers hug their children to their hearts, their mother love never dying."

We Thank You for Your Service!

More than 150 years ago, Memorial Day took shape amid the backdrop of the U.S. Civil War. Before it ended, women began decorating the graves of fallen soldiers. In 1868, when May 30 was designated as Decoration Day, loved ones placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers alike.

By 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored too. Over time, it became a day to remember all loved ones who have died — in war and otherwise. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May. On Memorial Day, we pause to remember people who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country and for our freedom. We also pray for those who continue serving, especially those in harm's way.

To those from Fort Hill UMC who have served in our armed forces, and those who are currently serving, we thank you for your service!
