

In last month's newsletter I began a series on theological emphases of the Christian faith by writing about how the Christian faith defines the historical presence of Jesus through the incarnation (God becoming flesh). This month's newsletter is about how The United Methodist Church teaches the incarnational presence of Jesus through the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion as two signs of God's grace that Jesus either participated in (Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist) or initiated (Jesus' sharing a last meal with his disciples) and commanded his disciples to observe so their Christian faith may be strengthened and confirmed.

Baptism is a covenantal sign of God's renewing love that is administered to infants, children, youth, or adults through water. Following the Jewish tradition of circumcision being the sign of the community of Abraham that

is affirmed through Bar Mitzvah or Bat Mitzvah, baptism is the sign of the community of Christ that is affirmed through confirmation when the baptized professes faith in Jesus and becomes a confirmed member of the body of Christ.

The Lord's Supper is the second sacrament observed in The United Methodist Church. Whereas the water of baptism is applied only once as a sign of the community of Christ, the ritual of The Last Supper is observed regularly as a means of sustenance of faith. The incarnational presence of Jesus is affirmed through the bread and the Cup as participants remember the body of Christ that was broken for them and the blood of Jesus that was shed for them. Unlike the Roman Catholic tradition that teaches the bread and the cup become the literal body and blood of Christ, the Lutheran tradition that teaches the bread and the cup contain the spiritual essence of Christ, or the Anabaptist tradition that teaches the Lord's Supper is a memorial act observed by the participants. The United Methodist Church teaches that Jesus is just as present now in the receiving of the bread and cup as he was in the upper room where he told his disciples to eat and drink in remembrance of him.

Baptism and The Lord's Supper – may these two sacraments of God's searching, finding, and sending grace, strengthen and confirm your faith in Jesus. -Marc

Life Without Lack: Living in the Fullness of Psalm 23
Dallas Willard – Nelson Books, 2018

Most of us can recite Psalm 23 from memory. This is a psalm of David, who was a shepherd in his youth and it is an expression of David's intimate relationship with God. He knew the covenant promises

and walked in them, experiencing all the goodness of God. In spite of all that happened to him, David still held onto those promises – and so can we. God does care for us; our lives depend on Him. He provides for us from His abundant supply, He feeds us and protects us. Our total dependence upon

God is the true secret of living with contentment, peace, and security. Follow along as Dallas Willard takes us on a journey into the depths of our own dependence on God. There are also study guides included in the book to lead you into a deeper understanding of God's promises of the abundant life.

Fort Hill has entered into a local mission ministry entitled Warm Streets. This is a ministry that provides clean socks for the homeless and near homeless of Central Virginia. 2023-2024 UWF Reading Program Is Underway

UWF books we are reading this year are located in our Church Library on the bookcase to the right as you enter the Library or at your local library.

For November we will be reading *Daughter of Cana* by Angela Hunt. This is the first book from the "Jerusalem Road" series.

About the Book:

Thomas and Tasmin, twin siblings hired to oversee a wedding feast in Cana, worry when the host runs out of wine . . . until a guest tells Tasmin to have the servants fill the pitchers by the gate with water from the cistern. Reluctantly, she obeys and is amazed when rainwater turns into the finest wine ever tasted in Cana.

When Thomas impulsively decides to follow the teacher from Nazareth, he and Tasmin argue—since the twins have been together since the womb, Tasmin can't accept losing her brother to some magician prophet. Aided by Jude, younger brother to Jesus of Nazareth, she decides to follow the Nazarene's group and do whatever she must to mend the fractured relationship and bring her brother home.
