# 2023-2024 UWF Reading Program Is Underway

For December, we will be reading *World of Wonders* by Aimee Nezhukumatathil.

About the Book from Goodreads:

From beloved, award-winning poet Aimee Nezhuku-matathil comes a debut work of nonfiction--a collection of essays about the natural world, and the way its inhabitants can teach, support, and inspire us.

As a child, Nezhukumatathil called many places home: the grounds of a Kansas mental institution, where her Filipino mother was a doctor; the open skies and tall mountains of Arizona, where she hiked with her Indian father; and the chillier climes of western New York and Ohio. But no matter where she was transplanted--no matter how awkward the fit or forbidding the landscape--she was able to turn to our world's fierce and funny creatures for guidance.

"What the peacock can do," she tells us, "is remind you of a home you will run away from and run back to all your life." The axolotl teaches us to smile, even in the face of unkindness; the touch-me-not plant shows us how to shake off unwanted advances; the narwhal demonstrates how to survive in hostile environments. Even in the strange and the unlovely, Nezhukumatathil finds beauty and kinship. For it is this way with wonder: it requires that we are curious enough to look past the distractions in order to fully appreciate the world's gifts.

Warm, lyrical, and gorgeously illustrated by Fumi Nakamura, World of Wonders is a book of sustenance and joy.



## What Is the Meaning of the Advent Wreath?

During Advent, which begins this year on December 3, many churches and families use wreaths to symbolize watchfulness and increasing joy as Christmas approaches. Colors for the candles vary, with some traditions using blue (for hope or creation) and others preferring purple (for royalty, humility or penitence).

The four candles that each represent a week in Advent also signify hope, peace, joy and love. (The third candle is often pink.) In the center is the white Christ candle, representing Jesus as the light of the world. That candle is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

The round Advent wreath has special meaning of its own. It symbolizes eternal life and the unending love of God, who sent his only Son to earth to die in our place.

#### **Christmas Ribbon Salad**

2 packages (3 oz. each) sugar-free lime gelatin

5 cups boiling water, divided

4 cups cold water, divided

2 packages (3 oz. each) sugar-free lemon gelatin

1 package (8 oz.) reduced-fat cream cheese, cubed

1 can (8 oz.) crushed pineapple, undrained

1/4 cup chopped pecans

2 cups reduced-fat whipped topping

2 packages (3 oz. each) sugar-free cherry gelatin

1. In a bowl, dissolve lime gelatin in 2 cups boiling water. Add 2 cups cold water; stir. Pour into a 13x9 inch dish coated with cooking spray. Refrigerate until almost set, about 2 hours.

2. In a bowl, dissolve lemon gelatin in 1 cup boiling water; whisk in cream cheese until smooth. Stir in pineapple and pecans. Fold in whipped topping. Spoon over first layer. Refrigerate until firm, about 1 hour.

3. In a bowl, dissolve cherry gelatin in remaining boiling water. Add remaining cold water stir. Chill until syrupy and slightly thickened. Carefully spoon over second layer. Refrigerate until set, about 4 hours. Yield 15 servings.

#### **Easy Potato Rolls**

2 packages (1/4 ounce each) active dry yeast 1-1/3 cups warm water (110° to 115°), divided 1 cup warm mashed potatoes (do not add milk & butter) 2/3 cup sugar 2/3 cup shortening 2 large eggs, room temperature

2-1/2 teaspoons salt

6 to 6-1/2 cups all-purpose flour

In a small bowl, dissolve yeast in 2/3 cup warm water. In a large bowl, combine mashed potatoes, sugar, shortening, eggs, salt, remaining 2/3 cup water, yeast mixture and 2 cups flour; beat until smooth. Stir in enough remaining flour to form a soft dough

Do not knead. Shape into a ball; place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease the top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 1 hour.

Punch down dough; divide into thirds. Divide and shape 1 portion into 15 balls; place in a greased 9-in. round baking pan. Cover with a kitchen towel. Repeat with remaining dough. Let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 30 minutes. Preheat oven to 375°.

Bake rolls until golden brown, 20-25 minutes. Remove from pans to wire racks. Serve warm. -*Anonymous*
