It has been a little over a year since Ronnie Seale officially opened the Medical Supply Closet. We have served individuals from Amherst, Bedford and the Lynchburg community. In 2023, 18 individuals have received equipment that was needed In 2024, 6 individuals have been able to obtain equipment. We have received equipment from Fort Hill members as well as Heritage UMC and Timberlake Church. Individuals who have received the equipment have asked for prayers for their loved ones, and they all express appreciation for the service.

The Special Easter Offering this year will go toward our missionaries in South East Asia.

We continue to provide monthly treats to the staff at Perrymont Elementary, and a team member goes every Wednesday and Friday to sort fruits and vegetables into baskets for teachers to pick up, so each child will have an opportunity to be exposed to different foods that they may not receive at home.

The 2024 General Conference of The United Methodist Church will meet on April 23 – May 3 in Charlotte, North Carolina. Ordinarily, General Conference meets every 4 years, but due to the COVID pandemic in 2020, this will be the first regular session since 2016. A total of 864 delegates will attend General Conference and represent a proportional number of elected laity and clergy delegates from annual conferences located in four continents where The United Methodist Church is present. General Conference is the highest legislative body and the authoritative voice of The United Methodist Church as it establishes the doctrine, missional direction, constitution, church law, rules of organization, procedures, and budget of our denomination. Primary among the considerations of The General Conference are revisions to our de-

nomination's Book of Discipline (the denomination's governing document) and Book of Resolutions (positions on current issues).

Much has happened in The United Methodist Church since the 2016 General Conference. A denomination entitled The Global Methodist Church (composed of a quarter of former United Methodist congregations that departed under a disaffiliation policy) has organized primarily in response to social and authority concerns that have been ongoing conversations within The United Methodist Church since the 1972 General Conference. Having served as an alternate member of The General Conference in 2004, a member of the General Conference in 2008 and 2012, and as a member of the denomination's Connectional Table (committee that provides oversight for ministries of The United Methodist Church) in 2016, I have observed two conversations that have defined the differences between these two denominations.

The first conversation is about opinion and conformity. Within The Global Methodist Church, this conversation has been shaped by a new book of discipline that emphasizes uniformity of opinion among the churches as expressed by conformity to the power of the majority. Within The United Methodist Church, this conversation has been shaped by the diversity of opinion that seeks to empower the voice of those who struggle to have their voices heard.


The second conversation is about what will be a major topic of discussion at the upcoming General Conference – regionalization. Since the formation of The United Methodist Church in 1968, there has been a growing presence of the denomination as currently realized in four continents. The *Book of Discipline* reflects both the reality and the challenge of The United Methodist Church beginning as a U. S. centric denomination by permitting regions of the denomination outside of the United States to adapt the mission of their regions to their unique missional concerns. Under the proposed plan, there will be four regional conferences — Africa, Europe, Philippines, and the U.S. — all possessing the same duties and powers to pass legislation for greater missional impact in their respective regions.

The reason the conversation about regionalization will be of significance at the upcoming General Conference is rooted in the first conversation about opinion and conformity. Delegates of the General Conference, who do not wish to see the current restrictions toward human sexuality in the United States changed to more permissive language, will seek to maintain the current restrictions as the uniformity of opinion aligns the votes of conservative delegates from countries outside the United States, and with the votes of conservative delegates within the United States. Should the legislation be approved, it will result in the region of the United States having the same rights as currently afforded to the regions of The United Methodist Church, and will free the other regions of The United Methodist Church from having to make decisions that are focused upon the United States.

The stated mission of The United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. I pray that this mission will guide the conversations of the upcoming General Conference.

# **General Conference News**

The General Conference of The United Methodist Church will meet in Charlotte, North Carolina, on April 23 – May 3. As the denomination's highest legislative body, General Conference is the denomination's highest legislative body. As such, it has the authority to revise the denomination's Book of Discipline (the denomination's governing document that contains its doctrine, constitution, church law, rules of organization and procedures) and Book of Resolutions (contains the denomination's positions on current social issues. Resolutions expire after eight years unless General Conference readopts them).

General Conference approves the four-year budget allocating apportionments — shares of church giving — for denomination-wide ministries around the globe. General Conference also sets the formula used for apportioning the budget to annual conferences, the denomination's regional bodies, which in turn ask for apportionments from local churches.

In addition, the assembly approves theological statements on subjects such as baptism and communion. The coming General Conference will consider adopting a theological statement on the United Methodist understanding of church titled <u>"Sent in Love."</u>

General Conference also elects members of the Judicial Council, the denomination's top court; members of the commission that plans General Conference; and some members of other denominational leadership bodies.

The Book of Discipline states that any United Methodist organization, clergy member or lay member may submit a General Conference petition — basically the United Methodist equivalent of a bill before a legislature.

All told, the coming General Conference has received 1,099 total valid petitions — including 352 new petitions submitted since General Conference's delay in 2020. Some of those petitions were submitted by people who have since left The United Methodist Church.
