

A Season of Stewardship...A Time of "Thanks-Living."

During the fall of each year, many churches engage in financial campaigns and stewardship programs in an effort to fund the church's budgetary needs for the coming year. Church members brace themselves for the annual plea for funds, as pastors and leaders stand before their people and "beg for money." Varying means and methods are used, and many of them operate on a "fundraising model" rather than a true Christian stewardship model. There is a difference.

According to Herb Miller, author of the *Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program*, "the goal of secular fundraising is dollars for a worthy cause. The goal of Chris-

tian stewardship is the faithful management of all that God gives so that God can use our gifts to transform us spiritually and to extend Christ's transforming love to others." (*New Consecration Sunday, p. 7*). Christian stewardship invites us to pray and seek God's guidance for what God would have us do financially and spiritually in the coming year. Christian stewardship invites us to step out in faith and trust God to provide.

During the month of November, we will explore Scripture together in worship that will help us take a deeper look into what God says about money. We will prayerfully consider giving as a spiritual discipline and open ourselves to God's leading in our own lives and in our life together as a body of believers. We will talk about the stewardship of our time, talents, gifts, service and witness in the context of Christian discipleship. We will pray that God will enable us to respond faithfully to that which we are called to do by giving and living our thanks.

In early November, the congregation will receive stewardship information with an invitation to complete a Faith Promise Card for 2026. November 23 is Commitment Sunday, when we will have the opportunity to prayerfully consider our commitments and return our cards, through the offering, during worship. It is my prayer that all of us will use this season of stewardship and thanksgiving to grow in greater faithfulness. May our gracious and generous Lord bless us as we prayerfully seek and discern God's will for ourselves and for our church in the coming year.

Three Simple Rules and Three Simple Questions
Rueben P. Job Abingdon Press, 2007, 2011

I am sure you have heard the old saying that "things come in threes," or "bad things come in threes." In the church, we have the Holy Trinity. For some reason, the number three is significant in many

cultures and religions. In these two little books, Bishop Job deals with two sets of important "threes." The first, the three rules of living by John Wesley: Do no harm; Do good; and, Stay in love with God. "To love God with my whole being and to love my neighbor as much as I love myself was ... declared to be essential to our spiritual life, our life of

faith, and our life with God." The second book also deals with the questions of our relationship with God: Who is God?; Who am I?; and, Who are we together? "Our identity is found and formed by the God we worship and serve. Our life together as Christians is discovered, held together, and lived out based on our understanding of the God we have come to know and seek to follow." Remember that you are God's beloved child, just like every other person, and, together, we make up God's family. Don't forget: "God is greater than anything we can comprehend or imagine." Get to know God through realizing that we all are his children. Knowing this helps us to see others as they are with the capacity to live as God's children. Stay in love with God and really live!

Special Thanksgiving Offering to be Received

Each year, the church receives a special Thanksgiving offering, which, in years past, has been used to help in any area where there is a shortfall of cash flow, and last year was designated to be given to Lynchburg Daily Bread.

This year, the Finance Committee has decided that this special offering will be divided between Park View Food for Thought and Food for Families. The Food for Thought program provides food to "food-insecure" students, identified by teachers and/or counselors, for them to have while at home during weekends. The Food for Families program allows neighbors to visit the pantry a maximum of two times per month, with no more than one visit per week. allowing them to take an active part in the shopping experience by choosing from the products Park View provides. These include fresh produce, frozen meats, baked goods, and dairy items in addition to non-perishable groceries. The Committee feels that meals and food are very important items in our community, and that this would be one way of helping individuals and families receive nutritious food for the holidays. It is hoped that you will want to be a part of this ministry by contributing to our special Thanksgiving offering.
